

3 KEY PROBLEMS



Huge cost to society: Across Social Care, Health & Education





Out-of-home placements fail to address the underlying issues: problems reemerge and children return to care/inpatient

1. COST TO SOCIETY

Up to £288K
per child per year


6k per week for a teenager in care

Spending on children in care could make up 60% of childrens services budgets by 2025

£800 per day for a child in an inpatient unit

Total cost:

£23 billion per year



OCROUTCOMES

Care leavers:

- 6 x more likely to go to prison & 4 x more likely to end up with a criminal conviction
- 1 in 3 not in education, employment, or training
- Poorer physical and mental health

Research has indicated the negative impact of inpatient admission, highlighting:

- Adverse effects within the inpatient environment
- Disruption of relationships, education and sense of self
- Effects on family life
- Difficulty readjusting to 'normal' life after discharge

3. OUT-OF-HOME PLACEMENTS DON'T ADDRESS THE FACTORS THAT HAVE LED TO A CHILD BEING ACCOMMODATED ORADMITTED

IF a child returns home at all, the problems are likely to re-emerge

Nearly 30% of children are readmitted to CAMHS inpatient units following discharge

> 40% return to foster care having returned home unsuccessfully

It will work with families facing significant challenges that make it harder to provide their children with a loving, stable or safe family life that meets their needs. It will be based within and tailored towards their local communities."

There is a solution, and it works ...



- Cost-effective, evidence-based alternative to out-of-home placement:

 Approx. £45k for ISTAC vs. £288k for care/inpatient
- Immediate benefits & positive, sustainable outcomes for children and families
- Addresses the multiple & complex contributing factors to the problems

WHATIS ISTAC?

Intensive, community-based, therapeutic intervention, creating loving, stable, and safe families where children can thrive. Devised in 2017 by the Youth
Untroubled team, it's an
adaptation of MST, developed to
better meet the needs of children
& families with complex/multiple
problems.

The model has been commissioned by local authorities and mental health trusts across London, and by F-CAMHS.

ORIGINAL MODEL & ADAPTATIONS

ISTAC

Preventing out-of-home placement for children with severe anti-social behaviour, chronic conduct disorders and complex emotional and behavioural difficulties including harmful sexual behaviour.

ISTAC TRANSITIONS

Supporting children in foster care/residential provisions, secure provisions and CAMHS inpatient units to return to their families, quickly and safely.

ISTAC FOR SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES (SAC)

A 4-month brief adaptation of the ISTAC model for young people with EHCPs where emotional based school avoidance is a primary issue.

IS THE COST-EFFECTIVE, COMMUNITY-BASED TREATMENT PROGRAMME THAT IS ...

Preventing children and young people being placed in care

Reducing inappropriate and unnecessary

CAMHS inpatient admissions and shortening the length of admissions

Reducing crime and anti-social behaviour

Improving educational attainment and reducing truancy, preventing permanent school exclusion

Supporting children to return to family homes from alternative placements, and remain at home, thriving.

ISTACOMES 2020 - 2022*

- 89% of young people in education by the end of treatment
- 95% of young people had committed no further offences by the end of treatment
- 91% of young people were living at home at the end of treatment

ALL of these outcomes were sustained at 6-month follow-up.
